# Fall activities well under way

The school year is off and running, and has been for better than a month now already.

Frederick Area's enrollment numbers are slightly lower than they were a year ago on count day, which is the last Friday in September for all districts across the state. We are at 159 students this year, compared to 163 last year at this time. We were at 160 in 2017, so the number is remaining somewhat consistent.

The end of the first nine weeks will be here on Oct. 17. Time certainly does seem to go by fast! Parent-teacher conferences will be Tuesday, Oct. 22, beginning at 3:30 p.m. and running until 8 p.m.

The cross country numbers are up yet again this year in the program led by Coach Janelle Barondeau. Seven girls and nine boys are participating. The lone high school girl is Marissa Sumption, with the rest of the girls coming from the junior high ranks. Chloe Arneson, Sofia Losure, Laura Sumption and Morgan Sumption are all eighth-graders, and Zoe Cox and Gabby Millard are both in seventh grade. On the boys' side, there are a handful of high school participants. Kash Cutler is a sophomore, and the other four - Stephen Achen, Johnathan Bretsch, Nolan Jensen and Jericho King - are all freshmen. The remaining boys are Levi Little (eighth grade) and Winston Clark, Erik Losure and Milo Sumption (sixth-graders). The Region 1B Meet will be in Webster on Wednesday, Oct. 16, with a 1 p.m. start time.

The volleyball season will come to an end this month, with the last regular season action taking place in Leola on Tuesday, Oct. 29, when we host Potter County. Coach Holly Mueller is running the program again and has Shekota Lehmann assisting. Eleven girls from Frederick Area are on this year's squad. Those

are seniors Alexis Brotzel, Lauren Geranen, and Miranda Lai; junior Kaylin Achen; sophomores Allena Shell and Marissa Sumption; and eighth-graders Olivia Morlock, Jocelynn Ellwein, Chloe Arneson, Sofia Losure and Laura Sumption. The post-season will begin on Monday, Nov. 4, with a site and opponent to be determined later.

The North Border football coop is in its third year and is led again by Coach Trevor Van Tilburg. Only seven students representing Frederick Area are on the gridiron this fall, down from a dozen last year. Isaac Morlock is the lone senior, and Hunter Bretsch and Isaac Sumption are juniors. Kash Cutler, Mason Hinz, and Wil Nordine are sophomores, and Samuel Vetter is the lone freshman. The regular season will come to an end on Friday, Oct. 18, when they travel to Hitchcock to face Hitchcock/ Tulare. First-round playoff action will commence on Thursday, Oct. 24, and the second round will follow the following Thursday on Oct. 31.

Frederick Area's upperclassmen will attend the annual College Fair Day on the campus of NSU in the Barnett Center on Thursday, Oct. 3. It is an opportunity for them to visit representatives from post-secondary institutions, whether they be four-year colleges, vocational schools, or even the military.

The Frederick Area marching band will once again be marching in Groton on Oct. 11 in a parade that I believe will begin at 10 a.m.

and each of them had other commitments that were making it difficult to devote time to the organization. Others had stepped away from Frederick Forward's work earlier for similar reasons.

Those who attended the meeting were Krysti Mikkonen (president), Tracy Olson, Donna Sumption (treasurer), Jim and Kay Dumire, Connie Groop, and Heidi MarttilaLosure.

Frederick Forward was responsible for many events and endeavors in the community, and the group discussed what would happen to them.

Some things will keep going, at least for now. The funding for this newsletter, which comes from advertising revenue as well as support from the town of Frederick, Frederick Area School, and Frederick Forward, is set for the school year (through the May 2020 issue).

A low-key Snow Queen competition will happen in November-the group will invite judges to come to select winners, but there will not be a public event.

The Holiday Extravaganza has been handed off to other organizations: The Frederick Area Historical Society will continue with its Festival of Trees, and the Frederick Area Booster Club is organizing the vendor show and cookie walk.

The North Brown Community Foundation, which was started with support and an initial matching grant from Frederick Forward, is

established under the South Dakota Community Foundation and has a separate board, so it is unaffected by Frederick Forward's fate.

A big question mark is Finn Fest: Midsummer on the Maple. At this point the event, which started in 2008, would not happen in 2020 unless a group of individuals or an organization stepped forward to make it happen. Mikkonen pointed out that there is fund-raising potential in the event-the 2019 financials are provided here for organizations who might be interested.

Other events/projects in question are the Day of Champions, the baby boxes given to new families, and the mailboxes given to high school graduates encouraging them to consider moving back to the area someday.

While this might feel like a bad sign for the future of the community, that's not necessarily the case. Other
local organizations are thriving: The fire department and ambulance service have both gained members and renewed equipment in recent years. The Frederick Area Booster Club is active again. The Elm Valley Community Club has gained members recently. LearnX events about specific topics have been well-attended. A new housing board and a community choir just started.

This change might be part of a trend that's happening in nonprofit organizations everywhere: They are less likely to be centered around a specific geography, and instead are focused more on common interests. Ben Winchester of the University of Minnesota has done research on this change: "Historically, people would be involved in place-based groups with a wide focus, whereas today people are involved in much more interest-based groups with a narrow focus," Winchester said. His work was featured in a story you can read here, which also has suggestions for what nonprofits can do: http:// dakotafire.net/communities/ finding-people-serve-requires-innovative-thinking/7859/

One possibility is keeping 501(c)3 alive but flexible in how it's used to reflect the community's changing needs.
