The current fire station was designed for the size of vehicles that were available at the time it was constructed, according to Fire Chief Kevin Barton. Trucks are getting bigger, and the department needs more room to house those vehicles.

They also will have more room to move about around them. "We will be able to train with the trucks inside, rather than have to take them outside when it's colder out," Barton said.

The new building, located on the corner of the intersection of Main Street and Third Avenue, will have two drive-through areas—one for its No. 1 truck, and one for a pickup truck and a new trailer the department is purchasing for its side-by-sides. The new trailer is being funded through a grant from the State of S.D. Wildland Fire Division.

The drive-through spots will be at the south end of the building. Behind two other doors will be the department's tanker truck and the ambulance.

The new building will include a room for firefighters' gear. This allows the gear to be separated from other areas of the building to reduce the hazard of carcinogens that might be on the gear after fighting fires.

The rest of the main floor includes a utility area for washing gear, a shop area, a kitchen, and men's and women's bathrooms.

The second floor includes a training area, two offices, and storage.

Summit Construction from Platte, S.D., is doing the exterior construction. To save on costs, interior rooms are being built by volunteer firefighters.

The department's past and future fundraisers are paying for the building.

The building should be completed by Sept. 1. "We want to

have our fundraiser in there this fall," Barton said.

Along Main Street and Railroad Avenue is another big building project: The Frederick Farmers Elevator is adding a million bushels of grain storage with two 500,000-bushel bins.

This is a huge expansion to the elevator's current storage capacity of 580,000 bushels.

"We need more storage," explained Junior Linthorne, manager of the elevator. "Some bins to the east are getting in tough shape. And yields ain't getting any smaller."

He added that if all the prevent-plant acres had been planted last year, there is no way they could have held it all.

In addition to an increase in supply, there's also more demand.

"This is all happening because of AGP," Linthorne said, referring to Ag Processing Inc.'s soybean processing facility in Aberdeen, which opened in 2019.

"Guys north of us don't have time to haul all the way to Aberdeen," he said, so instead they sell their soybeans at the Frederick elevator, which in turn sells them to AGP. "Nobody wants their combine siting in the field. This gives them another place to dump so nobody has to sit."

The bins will change the skyline of Frederick—measured to the very top, they will be 105 feet tall. "If the water tower was down (the hill) where the bins are, they would be pretty much the same height," Linthorne said.

The bins are scheduled to be done before harvest.

Both Barton and Linthorne commented on the changes coming to Frederick this summer.

"It's good to see," Linthorne said, adding that the Community Store benefits from the activity when construction crews go there for lunch.

"The town's doing real well," Barton said.

Mrs. Langeley thanked everyone for their support in coming to watch the concert and encouraged the students to practice over the summer.







We are all subject to the effects of apathy. Every one of us is tempted to do less, give less or accept less. While this might be our nature-to go with the flow, to adapt to lowering standards—we also have the ability to resist this temptation. We decide when the extra effort is worth it. Whether it is our drive to be successful, to get in better shape or to learn a craft, in striving to lead better, richer lives, we can take the time and put in the effort to improve.

When we go through this process, we find it's worth it. We are rewarded by doing things the right way. This is how we develop pride in learning something new, in pushing ourselves further, or mastering something difficult. Through a series of choices, people grow prouder over time. We fill our lives with accomplishments and the rewards that come with them. This is the simple guide to leading an enriching life.

Communities function no differently than individuals. When community leaders choose apathy, residents follow their lead. In fact, it becomes harder for people to chose pride when they exist in apathetic places. It is easier to lead a life of pride when you find yourself in a proud environment. Plenty of people have risen above their environments, but there is a reason we find these stories exceptional. Humans are incredibly able to adapt to their environments, which is why it is so critical we provide people with quality environments to inhabit.

Once we understand these dynamics, we begin to realize how important it is that we use civic pride as the basis for making community decisions. If every decision was considered through the lens of civic pride, imagine how much better our communities would be, and therefore how much better our lives would be.

Think about the things you are proud of. You maintain them; you show them off; you treasure them. Those same tendencies would apply to our hometowns if they gave us that special feeling we get inside from the things we love.

This is the not-so-secret secret to real community development. Economic development is broken and generally just works to transfer local money to out-of-towners. Tourism is phony and does little for locals. All the tools we've been using to improve our communities for the last few decades are defunct. Civic pride is the simple way forward.

The cities that will win the future are the ones that foster civic pride.

- Cities that invest in beauty.
- Towns that work to retain and grow local ownership.
- Villages that work to foster friendships and deepen residents' roots.
- Neighborhoods that decide higher standards will improve
- Communities that cultivate their sense of identity.
- Places that opt for action over excessive planning.

These steps will transform people's relationship to their towns. This relationship is one of the most important ones we have in our lives, and it needs to improve. It is past time we toss out community development and economic development and accept civic pride as our way forward.




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Track: Sumption sets school sprinting records




